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BIOGRAPHICAL/HISTORICAL NOTE

Thomas C. Nicholls was a lawyer and judge of the Court of Errors and Appeals of New Orleans, Louisiana. His son, Francis T. Nicholls, was a governor of Louisiana.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The manuscript volume contains Thomas C. Nicholls' reminiscences, written chiefly from 1840-1842. The volume relates Nicholls family history and biographical information including the family's migration in 1805 from Baltimore through New Orleans and New Iberia to the Attakapas region of Louisiana. Included are Nicholls' impressions of New Orleans and the Creole culture of Attakapas. The volume contains handwritten poems by Robert Welman Nicholls (1815-1849, son of Thomas C. Nicholls); and clippings (1847) concerning military service of Nicholls family members during the War with Mexico, family deaths, and the death of U.S. Congressman Isaac E. Morse (1866). Morse's obituary was written by Oliver Wendell Holmes. Loose items removed from the volume include a newspaper clipping (1877) which traces the title of Pelham Manor of New York to land granted to Thomas Pell in 1666 by Richard Nicholls, a governor under the Duke of York.
