#### **BIOGRAPHICAL/HISTORICAL NOTE**

Jesse Dale Thorn was born on October 7, 1942, in Brandon, Mississippi. He grew up in West Monroe, Louisiana, where he attended Ouachita Parish High School. When he graduated in 1960, he joined the US Marine Corps and served until 1964. After separating from the military, he received his bachelor's degree in journalism from Northeast Louisiana University (now the University of Louisiana-Monroe) and his master's in journalism from LSU. He received his PhD in higher education from Florida State University.

After working for several Louisiana newspapers, in 1968, he was appointed press secretary for Edwin Edwards during his term as a member of Congress, serving what is now the defunct Louisiana 7<sup>th</sup> Congressional District. Thorn continued to work as Edwards' press secretary during his first two terms as governor. Following his time as press secretary, in 1974 he was appointed to the Louisiana Board of Regents as commissioner for higher education. His hire was specifically to work on mediating a dispute between the US Department of Justice and the state government over inequality between the LSU system's programming and facilities compared to that of the Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) in the state.

After a short stint as vice president for academic affairs at Northwestern State University in Natchitoches, La., he became a journalism professor at LSU. He remained in that position until his retirement in 2000 when he, along with his wife Diane, returned to Brandon. He died of Parkinson's disease on May 8, 2014, at the age of 71.

In 1969, the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare (HEW) notified Louisiana and nine other state governments that they were maintaining a racially based dual system of higher education in violation of the Fourteenth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution and Title VI of the 1964 Civil Rights Act. All 10 states were required to submit plans for the desegregation of their higher education systems and noncompliance would include termination of federal funds. Louisiana offered no plan and argued the state's open admissions policy showed compliance with Title VI.

In 1974, the U.S. Justice Department filed suit against Louisiana and its boards of higher education after contending the state's open admissions policy was not compliant. After initial discovery proceedings, however, the suit lay dormant until it was reactivated in 1979. In 1981, just before the case went to trial, the two parties agreed to a court-approved consent decree.

As per the decree, the state agreed to improve racial diversity at its public institutions of higher education through detailed recruitment plans for students, staff, and faculty; to enhance programs, facilities, and faculty at HBCUs; to distribute desirable degree programs equitably; and to institute cooperative programs and activities between the HBCUs and the LSU system. The two parties agreed that this program would be in effect for six years, at which time progress would be reevaluated. Additionally, a committee dedicated to monitoring the program was formed to collect data and documentation from every college and university regarding the efforts to come into compliance.

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In 1987, just before the decree's expiration, the Department of Justice moved that Louisiana still had not fulfilled its obligations. By 1988, after legal maneuvering on both sides, the court ruled that Louisiana remained in violation of Title VI and that the decree had not been effective. Louisiana was asked to submit a remedial plan for desegregation. When the two parties to the suit were unable to agree on a plan, the court appointed an overseer charged with recommending a desegregation plan, which took a year to draft. The outcome was the state's multiple boards of higher education would be combined into one. Additionally, the law schools at Southern University and LSU would be combined and all institutions would be differentiated by admissions standards. Neither university wanted this outcome and because it is not possible to compel students to attend certain colleges and universities, between 1988 and 1993, a series of remedial orders were vacated, and in 1994, all parties to the lawsuit reached a settlement.

This new agreement included the establishment of Baton Rouge Community College, which would be administered jointly by LSU and Southern, and allowed both schools to continue their own selective admissions programs. The settlement also maintained the state's multiple boards of higher education and left both Baton Rouge law schools in place. The plan called for more than \$100 million in spending during a 10-year term with the funding spent on construction projects at Southern and Grambling State to bring up the quality of facilities, fostering doctoral programs at Louisiana HBCUs, and recruiting black students to historically white schools and vice versa.

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#### SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The materials in the Dale Thorn Papers consist of legal documents related to *US v. Louisiana* and the establishment of a higher education consent decree, professional writings and journal articles related to higher education administration, photographs and drafts for a book written by Thorn, greeting cards and materials from the Public Relations Society of America. While most of the contents are related to the consent decree, Thorn's papers relate directly to what he worked on in his time as commissioner of higher education regarding the consent decree or wrote while working on his PhD from LSU [for Thorn's dissertation, see: *The Settlement of US v. Louisiana, 1980-82* by J. Dale Thorn, 1984, KF4155 .T56 1984A]. The materials present in the Thorn papers are broken into three series based on their content: higher education consent decree materials, written and published materials, and assorted materials.

#### SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

#### I. Higher Education Consent Decree Materials, 1978-1986, undated

The materials in this series are related to Thorn's personal involvement in the lawsuit *United States of America v. Louisiana*. This was a suit levied against the State of Louisiana that the state was running a dual system of higher education in violation of *Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka*, 1954. This series contains correspondence, handwritten and typed notes from Thorn, and assorted legal documents on which Thorn wrote notes. He also requested materials from other states which were also under orders to make higher education more equitable to see what their plans were, which are also present.

These materials are not an exhaustive resource concerning the consent decree but are made up only of what Thorn himself helped author or commented on. These materials comprise the first eight folders of box 1 and a bound blue volume titled "Excellence in the Eighties: The Master Plan for Higher Education in Louisiana."

### II. Written and Published Materials, 1979-1999, undated

The materials in this series are comprised of essays written by Thorn himself or others about higher education. Several essays were written by Thorn while he was working on his doctorate from 1979-1984, as well as from his time as a journalism professor during the 1990s. The remainder are from academic journals or other authors. All essays are on the topics of higher education, racial equality, integration-related court cases, and university programming. These materials comprise the remainder of the folders in box 1. This series also contains drafts of a book written by Thorn and the photographs that were included in it. It is unclear if the book was ever published.

#### III. Assorted Materials, 1985-2013, undated

This series contains three notebooks with materials from Thorn's career. These notebooks appear to be related to academic tenure, with sections on topics like service, publications, conference presentations, grant information, and potential publications. The first two notebooks are held together by comb bindings, are neatly bound, and are found at the back of box 1. The third notebook is in box 2 and has handwritten tabs. This series also contains a folder of greeting cards and materials from the Public Relations Society of America, both found in box 1.
